Synoptic Gospels – Legendary Lost Gospel Q or Proto Matthew in Hebrew?

Eusebius, Ecclesiastical (Church) History § 3.39.16 (written in) 312-324 AD attempts to pickup where Acts left off, He quotes a Church Father: Papias of Hierapolis (65-130 AD) concerning Matthew Papias writes as follows: So then Matthew wrote the oracles in the Hebrew language, and every one interpreted them as he was able. (Then went on first Missionary journey)

<u>MY OPINION:</u> Matthew the Tax collector was well trained as a scribe, he always took Short hand notes of what Jesus <u>Said</u>. He left a Aramaic Proto-Matthew of Jesus Sayings ... so there is no need for "Lost Gospel of (Q)". (Q). Just think of the value to the Apostles and others to have key words to orderly jog their memories of Jesus teaching during their preaching. A few years later, Barnabas & Peter's helper & scribe John Mark's Gospel of What Jesus <u>Did & Said.</u> A few years later, Matthew takes his outline and Mark's Gospel amplified it by adding his own additional memories making the finished Gospel of Matthew that has come down to us in Greek.

Throughout his Finished Gospel, Matthew pairs a series of narratives about Jesus with a lengthy teachings of Jesus. He then ends those teachings with the words, "After Jesus finished saying these things . . ."(Prologue 1:1-4-25) Sermon on the Mount Matthew 7:28, Proclaiming the Kingdom 11:1, Parables of the Kingdom 13:53, The Kingdom & the End 19:1, and the Olivet Address 26:1 ... (Epilogue The Passion and the Resurrection 26:2-28:20)

Luke joins Paul in his final journey to Jerusalem around 58AD. The Greek of Luke's first Paragraph shows this is what he did, not what he was going to do ... it is an Epilogue. He states he has used many sources: Luke implies that both he and Theophilus "had been instructed" by "Eye witnesses" Qualifications of an Apostle Acts 1:21-21 etc and "ministers of the Word" the very same Greek words he calls John Mark in Acts 13:5. It APPEARS Luke was written it in consecutive order.

All you have to do is be a believer in God to get these things done early ... and that Luke had a copy of Matthew and Mark before him, as he sought out other early sources. This is the belief of the First Christians, the early Jerusalem Church. Many Essenes became Christians, who were scribes and could read and write Aramaic, Hebrew, paleo-Hebrew and Greek ...their library proves that & their metaphors are found in New Testament -the way
